# Simple Tenses

Simple Present Simple Past Simple Future

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### Simple Present (meaning)

- The SIMPLE PRESENT expresses an action, state of being or state of mind that happens habitually or systematically in the present.
- Expressions of time most frequently used:
  - every ... (day, week, month, year, Monday, Wednesday)
  - in the ... (morning, afternoon, evening)
  - always, usually, often, sometimes ... (adverbs of time)

## Simple Present (General Structure)

- (affirmative) S + V (simple present) + ...
  - e.g. We practice sports every morning. She usually watche(s) TV at night.
- (negative) S + DO-DOES + NOT + V (simple form) + ...
  - e.g. I do not study English every day. She does not work in the afternoon.
- (interrogative) DO-DOES + S + V (simple form) + ...?
  - e.g. Do people like music? Does it belong to you?

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### Simple Past (meaning)

- The SIMPLE PAST tense expresses an action, state of being or state of mind that happened at a definite moment in the past.
- Expressions of time most frequently used:
  - yesterday
  - last ... (Monday, Thursday, week, month, year)
  - (a week, two days) ago
  - in (1998, 2000)

### Simple Past

(General Structure)

(affirmative) S + V (past) + ...
 [+ed for regular verbs]
 [internal changes for irregular verbs]
 e.g. Jack arrived late yesterday.
 They won the contest last year.

- (negative) S + DID + NOT + V (simple form) + ...
  - e.g. She did not visit me last week-end.
    I do not drink too much last Saturday.
- (interrogative) DID + S + V (simple form) + ...?
  - e.g. Did you go to the theater last night? Did he buy a car two weeks ago?

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### Simple Future (meaning)

- n The SIMPLE FUTURE tense expresses an action, state of being or state of mind that will happen in some moment in the future.
- n It has two structures to be used:
  - n BE + GOING TO + V (infinitive)
    n WILL-SHALL + V (simple form)
- n Expressions of time most frequently used:
  - n tomorrow
  - n next ... (Monday, Saturday, week, month, year)
  - n in ... (future years ... 2010)

# Simple Future (General Structure)

- n (affirmative) S + BE + GOING + TO + V (infinitive) + ...S + WILL + V (simple form)
  - e.g. She is going to travel next Sunday.

    I will see you tomorrow.
- n (negative) S + BE + NOT + GOING TO + V (infinitive) + ... S + WILL + NOT + V (simple form) + ...
  - e.g. They are not going to play football tomorrow. He will not finish the work by next year.

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# Simple Future (General Structure)

- n (interrogative) BE + S + GOING TO + V (infinitive) + ...WILL + S + V (simple form) + ...?
  - e.g. Are they going to work next month? Will you stay here tomorrow?
